In the year 1871 he married Miss Kate Eckels of New Kinston, Pa., who with her step-son Thomas Hines survives him.

Woodstock. Skeleton Found. Deputy Sheriff Spiker and Mr. Townes brought to town this evening the skeleton of a man found on top of the mountain west of Mt. Olive. Beside the skeleton, which was covered with leaves, was a silk umbrella, can, pistol, satchel straps, a solid gold collar button &c. The body or rather skeleton was covered with leaves, weighted down with a rock, the head having been pulled out by some animal, which was seen by grape hunters. The clothes show the man was
