Hepner's Items. A couple of weeks ago, Messrs. Noah and Erasmus Hepner, in

company with Mr. Noah Funkhouser, went out with a pack of hounds to shoot rabbits for a shucking pot-pipe, held at Mr. C. B. Funkhouser's. Mighty hunters were they - got 10 "possums" and 3 rabbits. In the afternoon the shucking came off, and there were over 25 present. We had a big, old fashioned supper - a possum pot pie and almost everything to eat our country affords, and justice was done a good meal. "Black Betty" is consulted sometimes, by the boss shucker, and the man that gets the most red ears of corn don't want to sell his favor, for we have a lot of pretty, rosy cheek girls, and kissing is mentioned way back in the good Book, when Rachel wept, when it ought to have been the other fellow.

Died. Near Forestville Nov. 26, Mrs. Fannie Pence, wife of Mr. Samuel Pence aged 53 years. She was the daughter of Isaac and Regina Painter near Woodstock. Three sons and two daughters survive her.
