Public School Items. State funds for the Public Schools of Shenandoah County is \$10,388.26, this fund is used exclusively for pay of teachers as was apportioned among the districts as follows: Lee 1798.77; Ashby 2009.33; Madison 674.97; Johnson 1080.66; Stonewall 1539.41; Davis 1766.69; Woodstock 518.73. Last year 126 teachers were employed, 74 white males and 48 white females, 1 colored male and 3 colored female. Average monthly salaries of males \$27.41, females \$24.87; There were in the county last year 103 schoolhouses, valued at \$44,896.12, of which two are brick, 88 frame and 13 log.
