April 18, 1883

May 2, 1883

Died. Emma Sibert, daughter of Joseph and Rebecca Sibert at Mt. Olive, aged 19 years.

May 9, 1883

Mrs. Martha S. Rhodes, daughter of the late Wm. Baker, and relict of Saml. Rhodes, dec'd., who fell in the battle of Gettysburg, departed this life at her residence near Mt. Olive May 4<sup>th</sup>. She died alone and her body was found on Friday morning.

May 16, 1883

Died. On the 29<sup>th</sup> of April, Mrs. Ellen Allen in the 48<sup>th</sup> year of her age.

Near New Market May 15, Mrs. Sallie A., beloved wife of Mr. Otis Moore, aged 34 years 3 months and 17 days.

Lydia Pinkham, the well-known patent medicine proprietor, whose pictures adorned the newspapers for so long, died at Lynn Thursday night the 17<sup>th</sup> aged, 64 years. She began by manufacturing medicine in a teakettle and in a few years built up a business of \$300,000 a year.

June 6, 1883

Died. Fannie, wife of Levi Emswiler, was born Oct. 10<sup>th</sup>, 1853 and died May 10<sup>th</sup>, 1883, aged 29 years and 7 months. A husband, 2 children are left to mourn her departure.

June 15, 1883

Since his departure he has not paid his numerous relatives and friends in this section a visit.

June 27, 1883

Proved Fatal. Adam Hottle, who had his foot mashed at Quicksburg whilst coupling train cars, died last Tuesday morning of lock-jaw at his father's home, Meem's Mill, near Rude's Hill. He was aged about 12 years.

July 6, 1883

Prices. New beans are selling at 60 to 80 cents per bushel; potatoes 75 cents to \$1.00; cucumbers 12 to 15 cts. per dozen; beets 10 to 12 cts; cabbage 5 to 6 cts. per head - all home productions. Cherries are bringing 15 to 20 cts, and blackberries 15 to 25 cts per gallon.

An Old Harvester. Mr. Benj. Clem, who resides near Quicksburg, aged 78 years, cradled his whole crop of wheat this year, cutting from 27 to 30 dozen sheaves per day. What to you think of that - 78 years old and still thus handle a cradle?

July 13, 1883

Married. On the 7<sup>th</sup> inst. by Rev. J. E. Seneker, Mr. Almon Sherman of West Virginia and Miss Mary E. Lindamood of Shenandoah County.

Colored Deaths. Noble, little son of Henry Chapman, colored, of New Market, died Monday morning and was buried the evening of the same day.

Annie, aged about 17 years, daughter of Jacob Jeems, colored, died last Monday and was buried Tuesday in the Lewis Bird graveyard near New Market.

July 20, 1883

Severe Hail Storm. On July 12 about 6 o'clock p.m. a most destructive hailstorm passed through Hamburg. It extended between seven and eight miles in length and three or four miles in width. The hail varied in size from a common musket ball to a hen's egg.
